- The Beefeaters, who guard the Tower and give guided tours.
- The Ravens. These black birds first came to The Tower of London in the 14th century. They are taken care of by the staff who work there. The ravens' wing feathers are kept short so they cannot fly away. This is because a legend says that if the ravens leave the Tower, the Tower and the Kingdom will fall.
